



The Apothecary by Maile Meloy


The Egypt Game by Zilpha Keattey Snyder


Elvis and the Underdogs by Jenny Lee

The Firefly Code by Megan Frazer Blakemore



Frosting and Friendship by Lisa Schroeder




The Girl Who Could Not Dream by Sarah Beth Durst


The Golden Fleece by Padraic Colum


Hoot by Carl Hiaasen

The Lightning Thief: The Graphic Novel by Rick Riordan, adapted by Robert Venditti




Lily's Promise by Kathryn Erskine


The Line Tender by Kate Allen


No Such Thing as Dragons by Philip Reeve

Resistance: My Story of Activism by Frantzy Luzincourt



Rookie of the Year by John R. Tunis


The complex web of relationships that make up a major-league baseball team is the heart of this story about a rookie pitcher who becomes a threat to his team's chances for the pennant.


The Secret Garden by Frances Hodgson Burnett


So You Want To Be a Jedi? by Adam Gidwitz
