


Anne of Green Gables by L. M. Montgomery


Bayou Magic by Jewell Parker Rhodes


Bernice Buttman, Model Citizen by Niki Lenz

Call of the Wild & White Fang by Jack London


The Call of the Wild (1903) and White Fang (1906) are two classic American adventure novels depicting the evolution of two dogs in the wild. The novels are in fact mirror images of one another, as Call of the Wild depicts Buck's journey from domestic to wild dog, while White Fang recounts White Fang's transformation from wild beast to domestic companion. Both convey powerful themes of redemption and survival that continue to affect readers even today.



Dead End in Norvelt by Jack Gantos




The Dragonet Prophecy: The Graphic Novel by Tui Sutherland


Eden's Wish by M. Tara Crowl

Ethan Marcus Stands Up by Michele Weber Hurwitz



Fuzzy's Great Escape by Bruce Hale




I, Emma Freke by Elizabeth Atkinson


Leila & Nugget Mystery by Deserae & Dustin Brady


The Lost Track of Time by Paige Britt

The Miraculous Journey of Edward Tulane by Kate DiCamillo



Olga and the Smelly Thing from Nowhere by Elise Gravel



Pugs of the Frozen North by Philip Reeve & Sarah McIntyre



Solo: A Star Wars Story by Joe Schreiber


Han Solo leaves his homeworld Corellia behind and dreams of becoming the greatest pilot in the galaxy.
