



Dead Voices by Katherine Arden


My Fangtastically Evil Vampire Pet by Mo O'Hara




Magyk by Angie Sage




The Initiation by Ridley Pearson


Scary Stories to Tell in the Dark by Alvin Schwartz


Scritch Scratch by Lindsay Currie


The Stitchers by Lorien Lawrence
