



Bad Bella by Ali Standish


Blow the Roof Off! by Lincoln Peirce


Dragonwings by Laurence Yep




Ghost by Jason Reynolds




Maniac Magee by Jerry Spinelli


The Mouse with the Question Mark Tail by Richard Peck




The Simple Art of Flying by Cory Leonardo


Sisters by Raina Telgemeier
