






The Danger Box by Blue Balliett


A boy in a small town who has a different way of seeing. A mischievous girl who doesn't belong. A mysterious notebook. A fire. A stranger. A death.

These are some of the things you'll find within The Danger Box, the new mystery from bestselling author Blue Balliett.




Dr. Critchlore's School for Minions by Sheila Grau


Elvis and the Underdogs by Jenny Lee




The First Escape by G. P. Taylor


How to Make Friends and Monsters by Ron Bates


The Hunt for Star-Lord by Amanda Deibert


Indigenous Ingenuity by Deidre Havrelock & Edward Kay




My Big Fat Zombie Goldfish by Mo O'Hara




Ninth Ward by Jewell Parker Rhodes


Saving Winslow by Sharon Creech


The Silver Arrow by Lev Grossman
