



#### Almost Home by Joan Bauer


#### Ban This Book by Alan Gratz


## Bedhead Ted by Scott SanGiacomo


#### Deep Water by Watt Key


## **Enginerds** by Jarrett Lerner


#### How Lunchbox Jones Saved Me by Jennifer Brown


#### Inkling by Kenneth Oppel


# Overboard! by Terry Lynn Johnson


#### Planet Earth Is Blue by Nicole Panteleakos


## A Rover's Story by Jasmine Warga


#### Sled Dog School by Terry Lynn Johnson


## Treaties, Trenches, Mud, and Blood by Nathan Hale
