




Big Foot and Little Foot by Ellen Potter


How to Catch a Garden Fairy by Alice Walstead


Mercy Watson to the Rescue by Kate DiCamillo

Pete the Cat: I Love My White Shoes by James Dean








The Little Red Fort by Brenda Maier




The Bad Guys by Aaron Blabey


The Day the Crayons Quit by Drew Daywalt








Sophie Mouse: A New Friend by Poppy Green






Kitty and the Moonlight Rescue by Paula Harrison



Runny Babbit by Shel Silverstein




Leo the Lightning Bug by Eric Drachman
