


Among the Hidden by Margaret Peterson Haddix


Artemis Fowl by Eoin Colfer


The Beast Within by Serena Valentino


My Big Fat Zombie Goldfish by Mo O'Hara


City of Ghosts by Victoria Schwab


The Curse of Ravenscourt by Sarah Masters Buckey


Encyclopedia Brown Cracks the Case by Donald J. Sobol


The Fairy-Tale Detectives by Michael Buckley


Ghost Hunter's Daughter by Dan Poblocki


Janitors by Tyler Whitesides


The Legend of Sleepy Hollow and Rip Van Winkle by Washington Irving (Great Abridged Classics)


Night of the Living Worms by Dave Coverly
